


Topic Sentences

"THIS IS WHAT I'M TALKING ABOUT!" - Topic Sentence

- A topic sentence is the unifying or main idea of a paragraph. It is often found at the beginning of the paragraph to give a reader an idea of what is coming.
 - Example: Bacon is also a good addition to any balanced breakfast.
 Bacon is healthy, wholesome, and the sound of it sizzling is enough to wake up a field of sleeping cherubs. If I could, I would eat nothing but bacon for breakfast until the day I die.
 - Notice how the example is all about bacon as a breakfast item. How do
 we know this? Because the Topic Sentence gives us that signal. The
 Topic Sentence says, "Hold on reader! We're going to talk about BACON!"



- A reader should also be able to take the Topic Sentences and Thesis statement of any essay and understand what the point, stance, purpose, and/or intention of the essay is.

Practice Writing Topic Sentences

The following sentences are examples of bad topic sentences. Rewrite each so that the topic is clear, narrow enough to talk about in a paragraph, and makes a claim of some kind.

- Bad Example: The Dust Bowl impacted many people in Oklahoma and California.
 - Revised: The Dust Bowl left Oklahomans with barren fields and forced many of them to migrate to California where they competed with the locals for jobs.

The first example is a bad topic sentence because it does not explain **how** the Dust Bowl impacted people in Oklahoma and California.

HINT: (If a topic sentence does not answer the questions how and/or why, then it needs to be revised.)
